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ORDER REINSTATING LICENSE
WITH CONDITIONS

THIS MATTER was heard on September 16, 2014, by the North Carolina Board of Pharmacy (“Board”) located at 6015 Farrington Road, Suite 201, Chapel Hill, North Carolina, upon the request of Mathew Martin Rosinski (“Petitioner”) for reinstatement of his license to practice pharmacy. Board members McLaughlin, Marks, Chesson, Minton, Day, and Mixon heard this matter. After hearing the testimony of witnesses, adjudging the credibility of the witnesses, and receiving evidence, the Board makes the following:

FINDINGS OF FACT

1. Petitioner formerly held North Carolina license to practice pharmacy number 14269.
2. On June 28, 2013, Petitioner voluntary surrendered his license to practice pharmacy.
3. On June 21, 2013, Petitioner arrived for a shift at his then-place of practice Alamance Regional Medical Center. Soon after Petitioner’s arrival, personnel at the pharmacy confronted Petitioner, believing him to be impaired. Subsequent urinalysis and blood testing established that Petitioner was impaired by alcohol when he arrived at the pharmacy. Alamance Regional Medical Center terminated Petitioner’s employment.

4. After surrendering his license, Petitioner contacted North Carolina Pharmacist Recovery Network (“NCPRN”), which recommended that he undergo an intensive substance abuse evaluation.
5. Petitioner underwent a four-day in-patient evaluation at the Pavillon Treatment Center, which resulted in a diagnosis of alcohol dependence and a recommendation that Petitioner undergo an intensive in-patient treatment program.
6. Petitioner completed a twelve-week inpatient course of treatment at the Center for Professional Excellence in late December 2013.
7. On December 30, 2013, Petitioner signed a five-year treatment and monitoring agreement with NCPRN.
8. NCPRN reports that Petitioner has been fully compliant with his treatment and monitoring obligations and that Petitioner’s recovery is such that he is safe to return to the practice of pharmacy with appropriate conditions.
9. Petitioner was not charged criminally as a result of his impairment on June 21, 2013.
10. There is no evidence that any patient’s health or safety was affected by Petitioner’s impairment on June 21, 2013.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Board, in its discretion, concludes that Petitioner can safely resume the practice of pharmacy with the conditions stated below.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that Petitioner’s license to practice pharmacy is **REINSTATED, SUBJECT TO THE FOLLOWING CONDITIONS:**

1. Petitioner shall complete an Application to Reinstate a Lapsed or Inactive License and pay the appropriate fee.
2. As part of the Application to Reinstate a Lapsed or Inactive License, Petitioner shall provide proof that he has obtained fifteen (15) hours of continuing education, eight (8) of which must be live or contact hours. These hours represent the continuing education obligation Petitioner would have been required to meet to renew his pharmacy license for 2014. Nothing in this paragraph relieves Petitioner of the obligation to meet required continuing education hours to renew his license for 2015.
3. If Petitioner submits the Application to Reinstate a Lapsed or Inactive License on or after November 1, 2014, Petitioner shall provide proof that he has obtained thirty (30) hours of continuing education, sixteen (16) of which must be live or contact hours. These hours represent the continuing education obligation Petitioner would have been required to meet to renew his pharmacy license for 2014 and 2015.
4. Petitioner shall successfully complete his NCPRN treatment and monitoring agreement.
5. Petitioner shall advise the Board promptly in writing of any change of address or change in practice status.
6. Petitioner shall not serve as a pharmacist-manager of any pharmacy.
7. Petitioner shall not serve as a preceptor of pharmacy students.

8. Petitioner shall not be employed as a pharmacist more than 30 hours per week, on the average. This hours limitation may be extended or eliminated as deemed clinically appropriate by NCPRN
9. Petitioner shall violate no laws governing the practice of pharmacy or the distribution of drugs.
10. Petitioner shall violate no rules or regulations of the Board.
11. If Petitioner fails to comply with any term or condition of this Order, she may be subject to additional disciplinary action by the Board.
